The system is also used to generate the list of students who were admitted in Govt’s Fee Waiver Scheme which was submitted to the Government for reimbursement. The system is also used to prepare the various lists required for feeding data in different ranking agencies like AISHE, Assam Govt. Portal etc.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- A number of faculty members are involved in course restructuring and revision committees constituted by Gauhati University. A number of faculty members are working as active members of University examination committee to frame questions papers and evaluate examination scripts.
- IQAC encourages faculty members to take up projects, publish research works, organise and participate in academic programmes.
- Students counselling and mentoring are performed around the year for the academic and psychological upliftment of the learners.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- An Academic Calendar is prepared containing the number of teaching days in the academic session, the schedule for classes and sessional examinations, cultural events, and holidays.
- Faculty members of each department prepare lesson plans and each teaching departments use multimedia and ICT enabled lectures.
- For the students requiring additional support, remedial classes are arranged time to time.
- Seminars, workshops and talks with experts from industry and civil society are organised at the departmental level in order to keep abreast of recent developments and emerging trends.
- The IQAC conducts a student appraisal of teachers, and takes a parent feedback to evaluate the teaching learning process at the institutional level and suggest measures for improvement.
- The Librarian and the library staff work in close association with the teaching faculty to ensure that the library resources augment the teaching-learning process and to impart orientation and training in accessing appropriate learning resources.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- An Examination Committee conducts all the examinations.
- Continuous evaluation through internal assessment, class tests, assignments, presentations, projects etc. have been done.
- Transparency is maintained in evaluation process.
- All the practical examinations are conducted with internal and external examiners.

6.3.4 Research and Development-

- The college has a research committee with 14 members headed by the Principal as President, Vice Principal as Vice President, a convenor, 8 faculty members, and 3 student members. The committee periodically invites Teacher led student research project from various departments of the college and after proper review from the experts, the projects are sanctioned. The committee also arranges presentation of the projects completed under teacher led student research scheme of the college.
- The Institute promotes interdisciplinary use of infrastructure for research because of space constraint for keeping new instruments and dedicated space for research activities. Under the DBT sponsored star college scheme, some basic interdisciplinary training programmes have been arranged for the students.
- The Institutional Biotech Hub of the college periodically organize some capacity building workshop and training programmes to generate interest in research among students.
- A number of faculty members are actively involved in interdisciplinary research as evident from the ongoing minor and major research project works and a number of publications.

FEED BACK ANALYSIS FOR THE SESSION 2016-17

The average scores (out of 4 point scale) of the teachers of the college of all the parameters for which feedback was sought is 3.3 out of 4. This score falls in the top 17.5% from highest score/point.

It is observed that the highest score, which is 3.5, corresponds to the parameter no. 1 (i.e. Knowledge base of the teachers). This score falls in the top 12.5% from the highest score/point. Thus as per the students perception, the knowledge base of the teachers in this college can be regarded as carrying the degree of strength lying within the top 12.5%

It is also observed that the lowest score, which is 3.2, corresponds to the parameter no. 6 and 7 (i.e. Ability to integrate content with other courses and Accessibility of the teachers in and out of the class). This score falls in the top 20% from the highest.

In this connection it is to be noted that the parameter no. 9 (i.e. Provision of sufficient time of feedback) which scored the lowest in the two sessions 2013-14 and 2014-15 corresponds to a score of 3.3 in this session. This score falls in the top 17.5% from the highest. This means, the dissatisfaction level of the students so far as the provision of time of feedback is concerned is 17.5% which in other words means that the satisfaction level of them in this case is 82.5%.

It is to be highlighted that the overall score of the department of Microbiology is 4 out of 4, which is the highest possible score.
