# Phases

## **Minoan Civilization (c. 3000–1450 BCE)**

Early Aegean culture with distinctive religious practices and monumental architecture

## **Mycenaean Civilization (c. 1600–1100 BCE)**

Warrior society with palatial centers and early Greek religious traditions

## **Greek Dark Age (c. 1100–800 BCE)**

Period of decline during which Homer's Iliad and Odyssey were composed orally

## **Archaic Period (c. 800–500 BCE)**

Cultural revival with development of city-states and formalized religious institutions

## **Classical Period (c. 500–323 BCE)**

Golden age of Greek civilization with flourishing philosophy and religious practices

## **Hellenistic Period (323–31 BCE)**

Spread of Greek culture across Mediterranean with syncretic religious developments

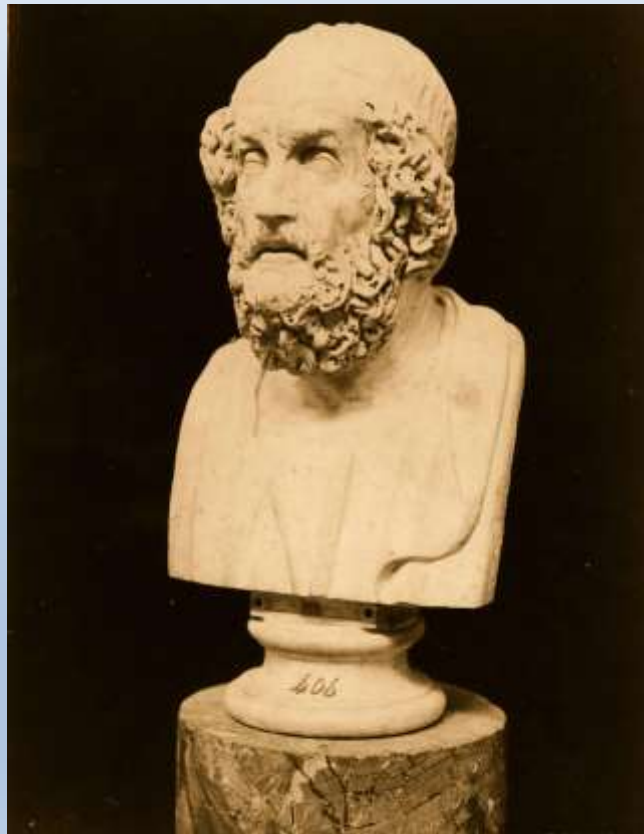
- Greek mythology

# Unity in Greek Religion

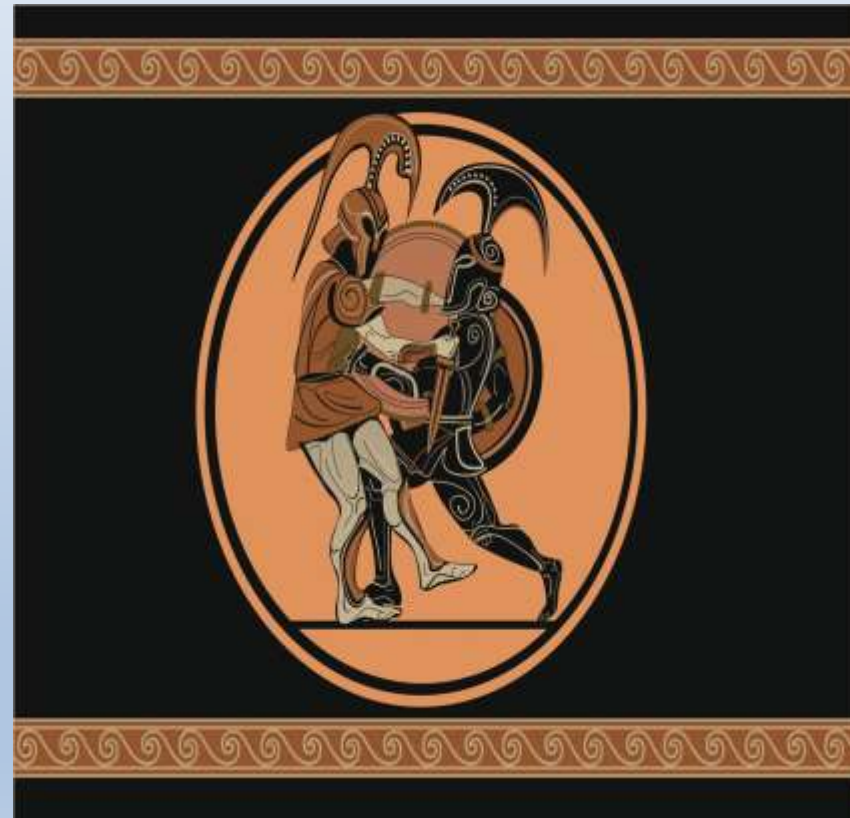
- Despite political divisions among city-states, Greeks shared:

# Homeric Tradition

- The Iliad and the Odyssey attributed to Homer
- Describe the gods, heroes and beliefs
- Reflect aristocratic warrior culture
- Influenced religion during Archaic and Classical periods

Greek religion was polytheistic, with twelve major deities residing on Mount Olympus. Zeus, ruler of the divine world, was protector of law and order. Gods possessed human-like qualities but were immortal.

## Gods

### Zeus

King of gods, protector of law and order

### Athena

Wisdom, warfare, protector of cities

### Apollo

Music, prophecy, healing, light

### Poseidon

Ruler of seas and earthquakes

### Demeter

Grain, fertility, agriculture

### Aphrodite

Love, beauty, fertility



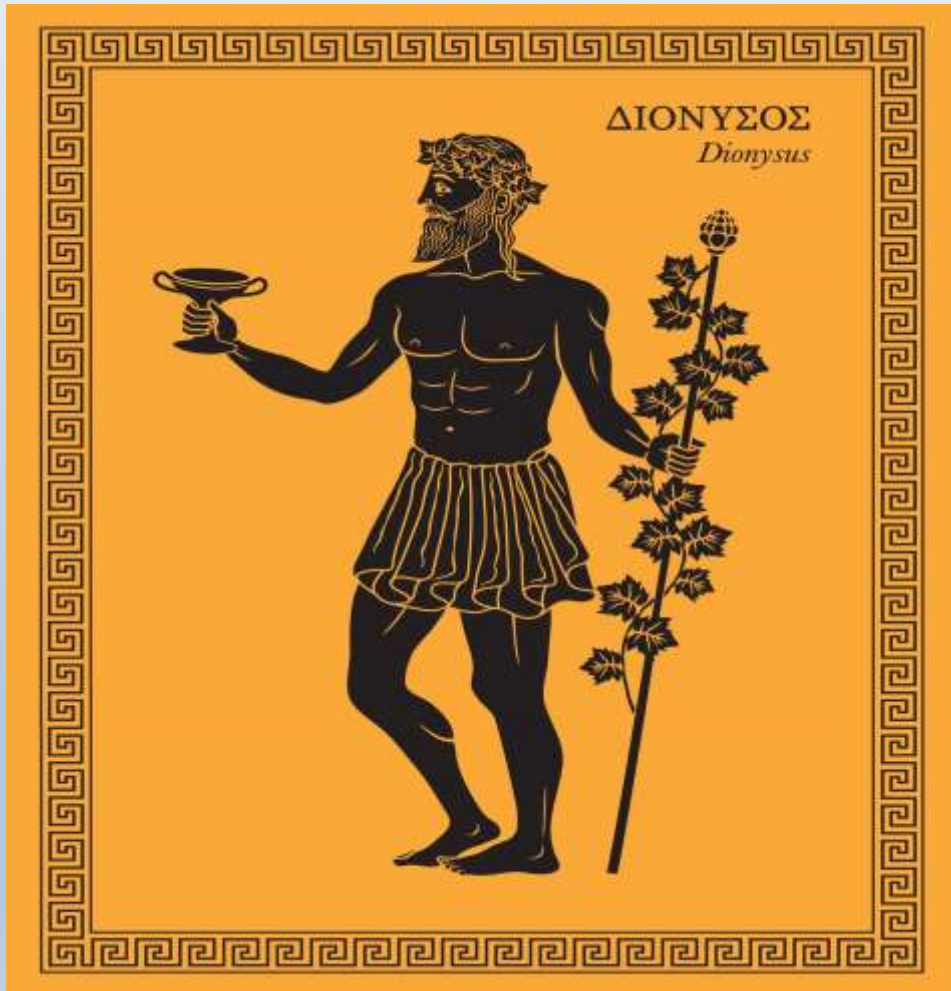

Dionysus



- God of wine, fertility and ecstatic celebrations
- Originated in Thrace
- Associated with theatre and dramatic festivals
- Symbolised emotion and instinct in human life

**Ancient Theatre of Dionysus: Birthplace of Greek Tragedy on Acropolis**



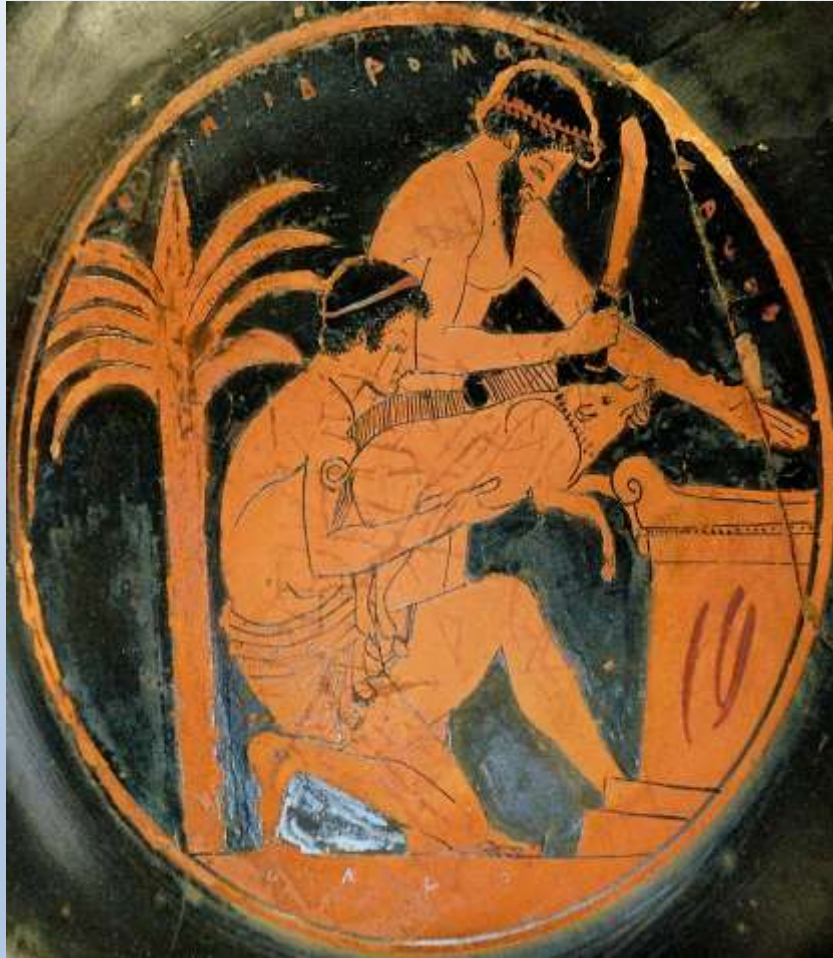
**Ruined Theatre of Dionysus, Birthplace of Western Drama on Acropolis**



# Rituals and Religious Practices

- Sacrifices and offerings to gods
- Household rituals for birth, marriage and death
- Public ceremonies connected with civic life
- Religious oaths taken by magistrates

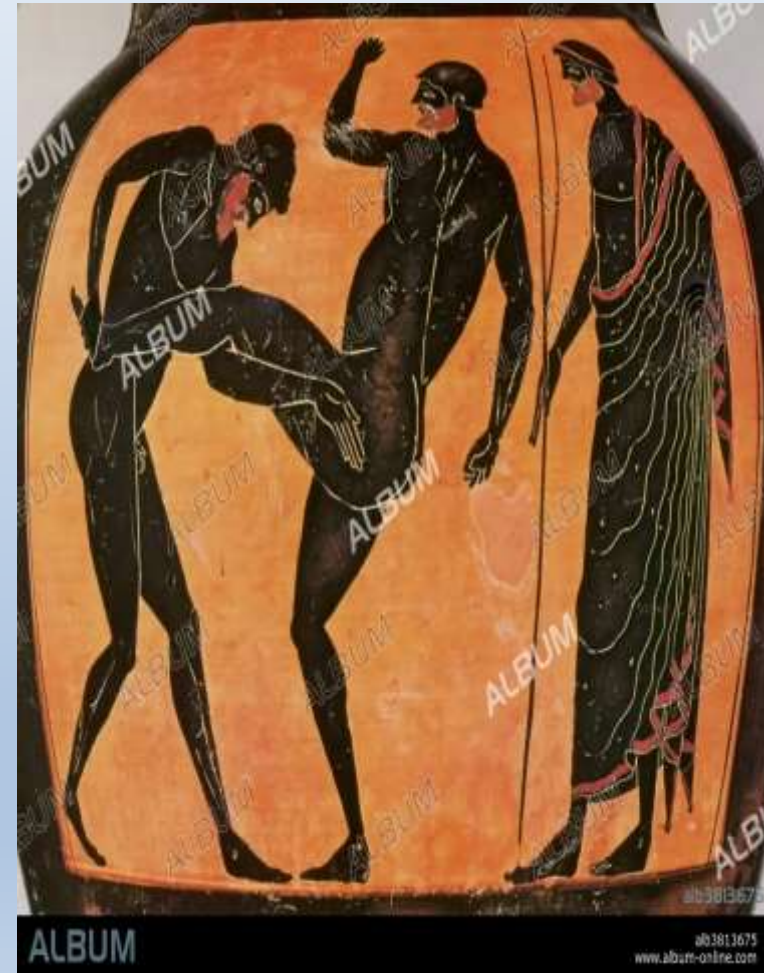
# Festivals and Games

- Great Dionysia – dramatic performances
- Panathenaea – festival of Athena
- Olympic Games at Olympia (from 776 BCE)
- Athletic contests with religious significance

- Ruins of the Olympic Stadium in the archeological site of Olympia, Greece, a major Panhellenic religious sanctuary of ancient Greece, where the ancient Olympic Games were held.

# Temples and Sanctuaries

- Temples built to house statues of gods
- Rituals performed in sacred areas (temenos)
- Important centres: Delphi, Delos, Olympia, Athens
- Parthenon built during the time of Pericles

# Oracles and Mysticism

- Oracle of Delphi – divine guidance
- Eleusinian Mysteries – hope of life after death
- Orphism – ascetic practices
- Pythagoreanism – philosophical religious movement

# Decline and Transformation

- **Intellectual Challenge**
- After Peloponnesian War (late 5th century BCE), Sophists questioned conventional religious beliefs
- **Foreign Cults**
- Spread of cults from Anatolia and Thrace. Worship of Thracian goddess Bendis became popular in Athens
- **Inclusive Appeal**
- Foreign religions open to women, foreigners, and slaves. Promised personal salvation unlike civic religion
